From the start my artwork has attempted to extract and express something emotionally and aesthetically essential from the humblest, most intimate swatches of life. Working primarily in paper, I create collage, assemblage, work in relief and small sculpture.

My work is grounded in the belief that even the simplest domestic acts and most ordinary of objects offer us the opportunity to bestow on our lives a certain grace and beauty.

I take much inspiration from the traditions of American folk art: appreciation for a material, fine craftsmanship, ingenuity, attention to detail, an economy of means and especially the ways an object often ages to advantage.

This material is the tangible fabric of our cultural history. Creating conversations between my work and American antiques makes this show very special for me; it's why I feel so much at home here.

Of course, every artist by necessity speaks from their own time and place, even when being influenced by something old. Into our homes we bring some version of the current world. It is at once the most personal site we occupy and a reflection of how we experience our speck of the universe. That is what makes the conversation so interesting.

Shelf Life, the show's title, is meant to bring the passage of time to the foreground. What exactly is it about an object that prolongs its usefulness, relevance and longevity, that is, its shelf life? When an aged object is reinterpreted in the present, does that help to keep it alive? Is it simply the cherishing of a thing that serves to endow it with special value? We leave the subject open for reflection and discussion.

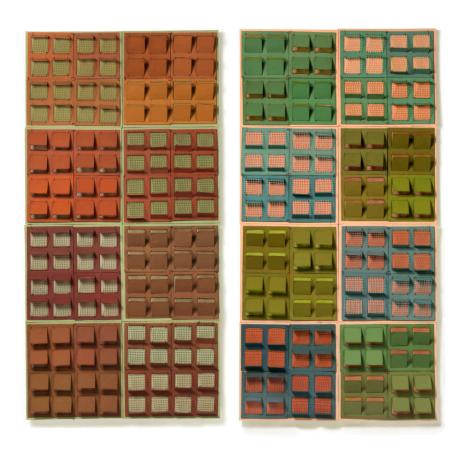

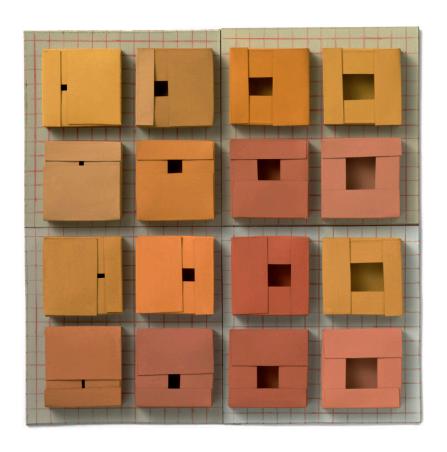

Paper: A Love Story

Laurene Krasny Brown has an affinity for paper. You feel it in her tender ministrations that change and transform the medium, yet never deny its materiality: It remains true to itself. Her compositions and constructions contain echoes, drawing upon the nature of paper as a palimpsest of associations that whisper of missives, prayers, declarations, gestural lines. Brown's process is slow, thoughtful, and deliberate. She favors Arches En-Tous-Cas, a heavy archival white paper, hot pressed on one side and cold pressed on the reverse, that she cuts off a large roll and submerges in a dye bath of saturated gouache. After drying and weighting, the paper is ready to be cut, shaped, marked, and painted using gouache, gold ink, and colored pencil; or pierced and collaged with found materials stitched with waxed linen threads in gorgeous hues. A treasured piece of recycled paper might find its destiny in an artwork, such as the vintage print forming the background in Summer Bouquet (2017) [see p04]. Her palette is quiet and earthy, given to stripes and grids and occasional bubbles that both underlay and embellish the surface of shallow constructions that cast strong shadows. The richest tones appear in the tiniest format, the *Tiny Abstractions* that explore sinuous shapes, patterns, and colors in a three-inch square or rectangle.

Brown finds emotional resonance in the unburnished essence of American folk art that has inspired her recent series based on nineteenth-century game boards and still-life theorem

paintings. In *Berry Bowl* (2017) [see p15] she inverts the theorem technique, which is based on the negative space of a hollow-cut stencil. She instead makes a positive of the hollow with cut-paper that she builds into a three-dimensional still-life composition. Lovely representational works reference domestic vignettes from her own environment, such as the antique wall-hung cupboard stacked with yellow ware that is surprisingly moving in its reverence for the simplicity of its contents and pleasure in small things.

Early works deploy an army of geometric forms seemingly placed with military precision. A closer look reveals restless differences, as each shape appears to shift its weight and assert its individuality. This is further explored in her interpretations of classic game boards, whose brilliant colors and striking geometric pattern find unanticipated depth in surfaces disrupted with raised elements. *Parcheesi Board* (2011) [see pp02, 03] adds a tongue-in-cheek reference to the folded paper children's game called Chatterbox or Fortune Teller.

Brown's art is intimate and labor intensive, the result unexpectedly healing. It may not be directly related to her previous professional life with children, but it uses the tools of childhood: paper, paint, and scissors. And with an undiminished sense of wonder and possibility, Brown assesses disorder in the world and through the deft touch of her hand she straightens, calms, nourishes, and restores rightness.

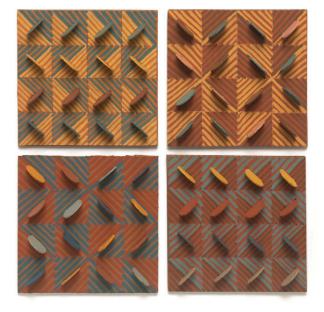

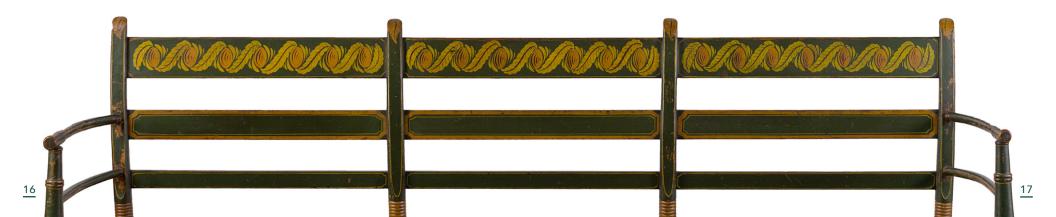

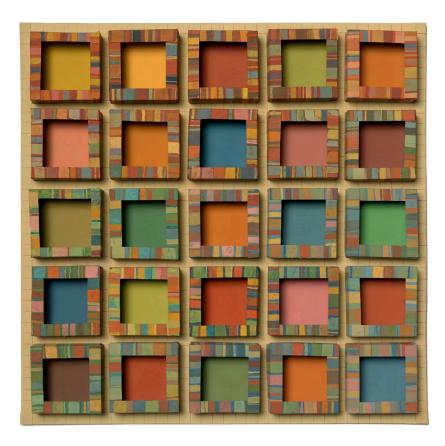

Laurene Krasny Brown

Brief Biography 2022

Laurene Krasny Brown was born and raised in New York City. She attended the High School of Music and Art as a music major, with higher degrees from Cornell University (B.S), Columbia University (M.A.) and a Doctorate in Education from Harvard University. She has broad professional experience in education, the arts, research and children's cognitive development. (This includes teaching and evaluating for the National Head Start Program, being educational toy consultant at FAO Schwarz, conducting market research for major advertisers of children's Products, consulting with producers at Children's Television Workshop, testifying about food advertising to children before the FTC and co-directing six years of research on children's learning from media at Harvard Project Zero.)

Prior to her career in fine art, Laurene authored and for one title, illustrated seventeen popular picture books for young children. Mostly non-fiction, these include titles dealing with well being, divorce, death, sexuality and friendship. Most recently she collaborated with her husband Marc Brown on their joint publication, Democracy for Dinosaurs: A Guide for Young Citizens.

For the past twenty years, however, she has turned her attention to fine art. Inspired by American folk art and working primarily with paper, Laurene has created work in collage, in relief and as three dimensional constructions. Her art has been exhibited both nationally and internationally, with galleries in NYC, Boston and New England. Her solo gallery exhibitions include shows at Stephen Score Art and Antiques, American Primitive Gallery, Olde Hope Antiques, Brian Morris Gallery, Shaw Cramer and Copley Society of Art. She has been a Visiting Artist working and exhibiting in Amherst Virginia, Paros Greece, Auvillar and Marnay-sur-Seine France and, most recently, at The American Academy in Rome. She exhibited in 2020 with JVS Project Space at Art on Paper, a New York City art fair. Her first solo museum show was just on exhibit at Fenimore Art Museum.



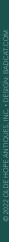
